

Supported by GOLD, PATS is raising COPD awareness in Africa.

We are excited to announce the launch of the GOLD and PATS Regional COPD Education and Awareness Program in Africa, led by Dr. Obianuju Ozoh, Vice President of PATS. This groundbreaking initiative aims to tackle the critical challenges posed by chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) across five African countries: Nigeria, Burkina Faso, Mozambique, Sierra Leone, and Rwanda.

The program focuses on improving COPD awareness among communities while equipping healthcare workers with knowledge and tools to enhance diagnosis and treatment. Key activities include:

- Educational workshops for doctors and healthcare workers.
- Community surveys to assess awareness of COPD.
- Distribution of educational materials, including posters, fliers, and short animations, to spread awareness.

A highlight of this initiative is the integration of the CAPTURE screening tool and provision of essential equipment like peak flow meters, ensuring practical training and impactful results. With generous funding from GOLD (Global Initiative for Chronic Obstructive Lung Disease), PATS is committed to building capacity, driving advocacy and fostering healthier communities.

PATS Member Achievement: Prof. Adaeze Ayuk Shines on the Global Stage







Prof. Adaeze Ayuk, a distinguished member of PATS, recently achieved remarkable milestones. On September 5, 2024, Prof. Ayuk delivered her inaugural lecture at the University of Nigeria, Enugu Campus, titled "Let the Children Breathe: Navigating the Narrow Pathway of Paediatric Respiratory Care in Nigeria." In her lecture, she showcased her extensive research and advocacy work in paediatric respiratory health, highlighting the burden of childhood respiratory diseases, their risk factors, and innovative management strategies.

Prof. Ayuk's recommendations for improving paediatric respiratory care in Nigeria, including incorporating asthma medicines into the essential drug list and promoting cleaner cooking fuels, demonstrate her commitment to advancing public health.

A celebrated academic, Prof. Ayuk has over 125 research publications and has risen from Associate Professor in 2019 to full Professor in 2023. She holds an impressive array of qualifications, including an MPhil in Paediatric Pulmonology (with distinction) from the University of Cape Town, a PGD in Nutrition from Boston University, and a Leadership Diploma from the University of Washington.

Adding to her achievements, Prof. Ayuk has been appointed by the International Paediatric Pulmonology Society (iNSPiRED) as the Nigerian Ambassador to represent the Nigerian Thoracic Society on its board. As an Ambassador, she will play a pivotal role in fostering international collaborations, shaping policies, and representing Nigeria at the global stage.
